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Compassionate Humanists?

When most people think of humanists, they think: Intellectual? Atheist? Godless? Anti-religion? Anti-establishment? Self-centered? Mean spirited? ... and on ad-infinitum. The fact is that sometimes they are quite right. However, the humanists I know, besides being very independent thinkers, are also some of the most kind, caring, altruistic and considerate people I have ever met. Where is the disconnect? I believe that the disconnect is only a matter of perception.

Many, if not all of us, have had a tendency to live mostly in our heads and pursue our own definitions of truth, sometimes courageously and publicly, but most of the time anonymously or in our small group of humanist acquaintances. However, we are also individuals who believe that we must act in this world, not in some future "world to come". The fact remains that, in general, we are not understood, or even worse, misunderstood. We need to let the world know that we have much more in common with all of them that what separates us from them; after all, we are sharing the same planet and the same environment. It is in this light that I am suggesting a few ideas that would enhance our public perception without compromising our principles.

We become signatories on religious historian, Karen Armstrong's "Charter for Compassion", which came about as a result of a Ted Talk presented by Armstrong, and resulted in her being presented with the "Ted" award, which enabled her to initiate the Charter. While, at first it was conceived as a means to get religions to find a "common denominator" for agreement, now whole cities have become signatories and I don't think that there is anything in the Charter that we, as humanists, couldn't endorse. You can find more about the organization and the full Charter at The Charter for Compassion's web site: charterforcompassion.org. She also has written a book called "Twelve Steps to a Compassionate Life"

Our food bank donations are very worthwhile, if not publicly known. However, I believe that we should become publicly involved, as humanists, in Tampa Bay social justice organizations. A couple of examples where we might start are FAST (Faith and Action for Strength Together) in Pinellas County and HOPE (Hillsborough

Organization for Progress and Equality) in Hillsborough County. Both organizations have been very effective in influencing public policy in areas of job creation, literacy, healthcare and affordable housing.

I don't think that we would have to look very far to find other organizations where we could become effective. I believe that it is time to stop relinquishing matters of injustice and caring to faith communities, after all, as humanists, we are committed to improving the earth and its inhabitants here and now. That is our only reward.

We are compassionate, not because we fear the "loss of heaven or the pains of hell", but because it is the right thing to do.



Humanism goes to the Dogs Some of our best Friends; Good & Bad!

Our experience of the world can often lead to a fine veneer of cynicism toward the pillars of our erstwhile civilization. Famous for his laudatory mention by Alexander the Great, the surly, lantern-toting Diogenes





This lecture begins with an introduction to the three main types of dogs distinguishable in ancient Greek and Roman art—lap dogs, hunting dogs, and guard dogs, respectively. We will then look in closer detail at some especially interesting examples of each of these types, particularly in non-mythological scenes painted on Greek black-figure and red-figure pottery of the 6th and

5th centuries BC. As with the dogs described by ancient authors (and often as with our own dogs today), we shall see a wide range of canine behavior, from the delightful to the disgusting. In addition to the unequivocally good dogs that quite clearly do their masters' bidding, and the unequivocally bad ones that bite, thieve, and otherwise make mischief, we find a few extraordinary dogs that defy easy classification.

Evolving a Humanist Ethic With Virginia Kohl, Ph.D

Gin is a member of the Tampa Humanists Association board, a former executive director of the **Humanists of Florida Association** (**HFA**), and was author of the educational program of **Carl Sagan Academy** in east Tampa – the first Humanist charter school in the country.

She served on the HFA board in 2002, when that year's conference, "Planting seeds for a more Humanistic world" included USF educational historian Sherman Dorn's presentation on think tanks, which foreshadowed the creation of the Evolution Institute: At the recommendation of Ambassador to Nepal Carl Koon, then HFA President Jerry Lieberman contacted evolutionary biologist David Sloan Wilson in 2007, and within a year's time, the **Evolution Institute** (EI) was created as a scientific think tank.

To date, EI has addressed social challenges from understanding early childhood learning and risky adolescent behavior to the "rational actor" model in behavioral economics, failed nation states, and ranking life quality.

Gin will primarily address quality of life (QOL), as introduced at the 2011 Memphis workshop and through the anticipated October 2013 conference in Oslo, Norway. She will contrast the lives of people in Memphis with those in Oslo, Norway, by utilizing various indices of Quality of Life

She will cite such instances where Norway is unique in meeting human needs. Whether or not the practices and policies of Norway can be applied and adopted to other nations is subject to reasonable and legitimate debate. What is not in contention is the track record of Norway in achieving universal recognition for its highest ranking in QOL by highly reputable sources.

Such instruments as The United Nations Human Development Index (UNHDI) has established a top-ranking for Norway when life quality issues are measured. Among the many parameters studied, the role of innovation was particularly intriguing. For some reason, the development of new industries that are less closely linked to natural resources, in spite of considerable support from public policy, has been much less successful in Norway." This suggests that "high tech" does not always lead development, a fact that ambitious underdeveloped countries will find to be of value. This has important implications for the future of our world and the progress of humanity.



NOW is a multi-issue political organization. NOW's self-defined role has been to initiate change for the benefit of the greatest number of people, to affect the legal and institutional structures of the society in a way that systematically expands the choices and possibilities available to all women. In this way, NOW takes action to bring women, as a class, into the mainstream of society, rather than offering aid to individual women in achieving personal solutions or temporary relief from oppression.

The Florida National Organization for Women (NOW) is in strong opposition to the Personhood Amendment ballot initiative for which the organization Personhood Florida is currently collecting signatures, according to Florida NOW president Donna Slutiak. "This amendment is ridiculous and an insult to women," Slutiak said. "The issue of Personhood would have very far reaching results, and would do more than criminalize abortion; it would also make birth control pills and the IUD illegal in the state of Florida. The amendment states that human life begins at the time when an egg is fertilized, which will also impact in-vitrofertilization clinics. How would you like your mother's fertilized eggs that are sitting in a clinic freezer to have inheritance rights? Do you want to have to go underground to get your birth control pills?" Florida NOW expects all intelligent people to pledge not to sign this initiative, and to vote against it, if by some fluke it does get on the ballot. Personhood is bad for womanhood."

FLORIDA REPORT Civil liberties news in the Sunshine Sta

Dear ACLU supporter,

The feds know exactly what you bought last night—or they could very soon, thanks to a proposed law that encourages companies to share data with government agencies like the CIA or NSA for cybersecurity purposes.

So get ready for powerful people in secret places to access your personal details on anything from the websites you browsed last night to that present you bought two years ago.

But, luckily, there's a way to stop CISPA (the Cyber Intelligence Sharing and Protection Act) dead in its tracks —by ensuring that President Obama would veto the bill if it ever got to his desk.

CISPA was recently reintroduced in the House, but a veto threat would kill the bill before it gets traction, and send a powerful message to Congress that any legislation that indiscriminately violates online privacy is dead in the water.

Just last year, thousands joined together in opposition to CISPA, and WON. Obama threatened to veto the bill last year, but in order to protect privacy online, we have to do it again.

Urge President Obama to tell Congress now that he'll veto CISPA if it lands on his desk.

CISPA would give companies unprecedented power to obtain your information, including from private communications, and hand it over to the government without a warrant if they believe it is relevant to cybersecurity. But it also allows the use of your personal data for reasons completely unrelated to cybersecurity, even granting immunity to companies who share your data with other companies.

CISPA supporters are using the specter of cybersecurity threats to execute a naked power grab for companies and the government, but we're not actually safer if it comes at the expense of our fundamental rights.

With so many pressing fights coming up, Congress won't waste time pushing a bill they know Obama will veto. We stopped this bill before, and with tens of thousands of us coming together, we can do it again.

As this momentum continues to grow, we will keep you informed of developments. JP Contact: tbcor@metrodirect.net





President Obama should use his executive powers to arrest or reverse the most dangerous, climate-related practices. Most of these involve the extraction, transport, and burning of coal and other hydrocarbon fuels. Obama should, for example, shut down existing coal-fired power plants and make new ones impossible to permit; strictly regulate or ban coal exports: ban the importation or sale of liquid fuels from tar sands and coal liquefaction; accelerate the federal drive to electrify our vehicle fleet, and follow the rest of the industrialized world (even China!) in building a nationwide grid of high-speed electric trains. It is not enough to complain that Congress won't act. The president can and must do what has to be done. Obama should deploy the U.S. military in the climate cause. No part of the federal government is more energy intensive, or energy aware than the U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marines. Rabid interest in ultra efficient, distributed, and renewable energy sources permeates all branches of the armed services. Every military facility should feature "living buildings," coated with solar panels and tied together in smart, hack-proof micro grids. The U.S. military has been the birthplace of many historic firsts, including racial integration and the GI Bill. Today, the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency might be the best cutting-edge science organization in the nation. "Organizing for Action," Obama's new advocacy group, should unleash a massive grassroots climate brigade. If Obama brings the full strength of his bully pulpit to bear on the climate issue; marshals the independent power of the cabinet departments and agencies; inspires the nation's technical genius and entrepreneurial talent to rise to the challenge; and mobilizes the 80 percent of Americans who will support him on his quest to overcome the inertia and save the planet, he will join the tiny pantheon of great presidents, the ones who make us proud to be Americans.







HUMANISTS CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE IN A CHILD'S LIFE

The need is great. All it takes is about an hour out of a day and the commitment to show up once a week. The feeling of having helped is most gratifying. How can we as Humanists not act to impact a child in the inner city in a positive manner?

YOU can give a child a much-needed hour of personal attention that will encourage reading and just might help them to move forward while improving their self-esteem.

In two 1-hour sessions, I have encountered children, some of whom have already had to repeat kindergarten, that barely recognize or are able to say the alphabet or the sound of the letter. This is half way through the school year. In two 1-hour sessions, 3 third-grade girls are unable to break down or sound out a word. They cannot grasp the concept of context since they are still struggling with the words.

Teachers struggle with discipline issues and the pressure of preparing the children for FCAT testing. With patience and intensive learning, you can help thee children grow into their potential.

Center for Inquiry Joins Coalition to Repeal DOMA

The Respect for Marriage Coalition, an initiative made up of a wide variety of groups pushing for the repeal of the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA), welcomed the Center for Inquiry (CFI), the first explicitly secularist group to join. CFI takes its place with other influential groups in the coalition such as the Human Rights Campaign, ACLU, AFL-CIO, Center for American Progress, SEIU, and many others. "We are proud to be a part of this powerful roster of organizations fighting for marriage equality," said Ronald A. Lindsay, president and CEO of CFI. "CFI's mission has always been to foster a society based on reason and science, and opposition to marriage equality is based on neither but stems from a stubborn adherence to outmoded religious dogma. We also believe in the values of secular humanism, a worldview that asserts the intrinsic equality of every human being, regardless of their sexual orientation."

The Center for Inquiry has long been a strong advocate of marriage equality and of LGBT rights generally, particularly as an international advocate for government's disentanglement from religion, which is used as a common justification for limiting or revoking LGBT rights. CFI recently joined 22 other faith-based and humanist groups in urging the Obama administration to ban anti-LGBT discrimination by federal contractors, and has produced a position paper in support of same-sex marriage rights.

"With a new office and expanded staff now in place in Washington, D.C., the Office of Public Policy is renewing its dedication to achieving marriage equality across the United States," said Michael De Dora, director of CFI's Office of Public Policy. "Joining the Respect for Marriage Coalition will be integral to accomplishing this goal. We look forward to working with all of the member organizations."

The Respect for Marriage Coalition describes itself on its website as "a partnership of more than 80 civil rights, faith, health, labor, business, legal, LGBT, student, and women's organizations working together to end the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) and grow support for the freedom to marry."

What is Tampa Bay Skeptics?

Founded in 1988, Tampa Bay Skeptics is a nonprofit educational and scientific organization devoted to the critical examination of **paranormal** and **fringe-science** claims, and the dissemination of factual information about such claims. In 2004, TBS became a Special Interest Group of the **Center For Inquiry—Tampa Bay.**

Particular areas of interest to TBS include UFOs, "psychic" power, astrology, fringe science & medicine, purported miracles and other New Age claims. Our interest in religion is restricted to claims that can be objectively tested and potentially verified, such as "weeping icons" or miraculous healings.

TBS conducts its own investigations, follows the activities of other skeptics groups, monitors the press coverage of the paranormal, and publishes a quarterly newsletter, *Tampa Bay Skeptics Report*, which is also distributed gratis to members of the press and to many other skeptics groups around the world. TBS also makes its representatives available to local and national media to provide a skeptical voice as a counterweight to the irrationalism and superstition that is increasingly prevalent in the television and print media. We have been instrumental in examining and reporting upon the Tarpon Springs "weeping icon," hypnosis, (in)famous psychics, local astrologers, etc.

TBS does not reject claims out of hand, but rather is committed to objective and critical inquiry. In this vein, we share the philosophy of the Committee for Skeptical Inquiry (CSI) -- publisher of *Skeptical Inquirer* magazine, an international organization that has nurtured the growth of local skeptics groups (such as ours) all over the world.


