It is important for all Americans to realize that Constitutional Secularism is for everyone. # **Raising Money for Charity**

The Foundation Beyond Belief has teamed with the Stiefel Freethought Foundation to raise money in support of the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. The goal is to raise a combined total of \$1,000,000. So far a total of \$29,920.42 has been raised. Thanks to the matching grant from the Stiefel Freethought Foundation, that is effectively \$59,840.84 that will be donated to the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.

And the fundraising has just started. We have until early Nov. to complete our fundraising activities. This year, we are raising money in honor of **Christopher Hitchens**, who died of cancer. Every four minutes someone is diagnosed with a blood cancer; every ten minutes someone dies. That is around 150,000 diagnoses and 50,000 deaths per year in the US alone. To date, LLS has invested more than \$814 million in research aimed at treating and curing blood cancer, with \$76.7 million in 2011 alone. They also provide direct patient aid for those in need, family support groups, and educational services. 76 cents of every dollar LLS spends goes towards LLS's mission of research and patient services. Over 100 teams have registered nationwide. Here in the Tampa area, we have five teams that are raising money.

The Happy Humanists are participating in the Lakewood Ranch fundraiser. The Center for Inquiry Tampa Bay and The Tampa Bay Parenting Beyond Belief group are both participating in the Tampa fundraiser. The Pinellas County Skeptics and the Center For Inquiry Tampa Bay Pinellas Chapter are both participating in the Clearwater fundraiser. This effectively means that Freethinkers will be participating in every Light Up the Night event in the greater Tampa area!



# RACISM (A Secret Superstition)

**Glenn Paul** invites us to examine our own lives and our social institutions as we continue to grapple with one of the most enduring problems of American life.

**Scientifically,** race is an unsupportable concept. DNA samples taken from people from all over the world will not produce any clear boundaries or markers that separate one distinct group of humans from another. This illustrates an important point; we're not looking at 'races', we are looking at populations. Human identity is not connected to any hue or characteristic, there is only the observation that populations that settle in the same area will tend to develop genetic similarities if isolated long enough.

Race means nothing. It is a concept that derives from social prejudices against people from another culture or appearance different from one's own. If you're going to discriminate on skin color and slight differences in facial features then you may as well discriminate on eye color or the shape of people's ears. While there may be populations who share some characteristics after some relative geographical isolation, there is no real difference between one human being and another.

So how does this relate to Humanism? Humanism represents an opportunity to use reason, science, and compassion to guide our actions in creating our world. Since racism is an ignorant superstition not dissimilar to religious superstitions, it has no place in our world. We need to make clear that it is not acceptable, and to educate those who believe otherwise. But racism is so endemic and hidden within our culture, that we are obliged to confront it in ourselves before we can deal with it as the social problem it is. We need to educate ourselves about the reality of racism. There is clear and incontrovertible evidence of racism within ourselves and our society, if we have the honesty to look. The data on victims of violence or harassment, the justice system, education, poverty, representation in business, the media and politics amply supports the notion of the lingering effects of a pernicious, deep seated cultural heritage and practice of subconscious and overt racist choices. Where we see this revealed in this season's political contest, we need to stop, investigate why it is happening and think about what we can do to nip this noxious weed in the bud. This is the Humanist obligation. JP

We now have undeniable evidence that cell phone location tracking is out of control. A front-page story in the *New York Times* makes a stunning revelation: mobile phone providers received 1.3 million law enforcement requests for customer records last year.

Here's the thing: there is no clear standard controlling when cell phone carriers can give your information to the government. That's why we need to get mobile phone surveillance under control. Urge your members of Congress to support the GPS Act.

Unregulated location tracking poses a real, immediate and far-reaching threat to our privacy. Everyone who has a mobile phone is carrying a portable tracking device, one that can be used to reveal our every move.

Given the sensitivity and invasiveness of these records, law enforcement agents should always be required to obtain a warrant and show probable cause before accessing it. This massive and growing use of cell phone tracking means we need immediate action setting clear legal guidelines for release of this highly private information. (TED talk here)

Ask your members of Congress: support the GPS Act setting standards for law enforcement access to your personal information.

# **A Trojan Horse**

A proposed Florida constitutional amendment has the potential to radically redefine the relationship between church and state, a rabbi has warned.

Rabbi Kurt F. Stone of North Broward Havurah in Coral Springs employed a historical allusion in his May 7 essay for OpEdNews.com. He referred to the famous battle of Troy when Greeks laid siege to the city but could not find a way inside the walls - until they came up with the Trojan horse.

The enormous hollow horse appeared to be a gift, but when the men of Troy pulled it inside the city gates, they unknowingly sealed their fate. The horse was full of top Greek warriors who opened the gates to the city, leading to an invasion.

"And ever since," wrote Stone, "the term 'Trojan Horse' has been a metaphor for any trick or stratagem that causes a target to invite a foe into a securely protected bastion or space. Like the folks of ancient Troy, we, the citizens of Florida have a Trojan Horse parked outside the gates of our once 'securely protected bastion':

Amendment 8." Continued Stone, "Far from being a measure to preserve religious freedom, Amendment 8 is intended to enshrine state government funding of religious schools and organizations." Stone argued that the amendment is not necessary, noting that the state can and does partner with religious groups under certain circumstances. If enacted, it will, he said, gut public education. Americans United has been working with Florida groups to educate voters about Amendment 8, which will appear on the Nov. 6 ballot.

In May, AU Legislative Director Maggie Garrett and Assistant Field Director for Religious Outreach Steven Baines toured the state, working with AU chapters on a series of educational events. Garrett spoke first in Ft. Lauderdale, then traveled to Miami and Dade County; she also spoke in Naples. Baines, meanwhile, started out in Jacksonville, then traveled to Flagler County. Garrett and Baines ended with events in Sarasota and Tampa Bay/St. Petersburg. Baines said he was pleased by the positive reaction he and Garrett received.

"People are really worried that Florida voters don't know what the real impact of this amendment is," Baines said. "The ballot language sounds harmless, even beneficial. But it's really a giant python that will strangle religious liberty and swallow it whole!" For more information about Amendment 8, visit AU's website at:

The Florida National Organization for Women (NOW) is in strong opposition to the Personhood Amendment ballot initiative for which the organization Personhood Florida is currently collecting signatures, according to Florida NOW president Donna Slutiak. "This amendment is ridiculous and an insult to women," Slutiak said. "The issue of Personhood would have very far reaching results, and would do more than criminalize abortion; it would also make birth control pills and the IUD illegal in the state of Florida. The amendment states that human life begins at the time when an egg is fertilized, which will also impact in-vitrofertilization clinics. How would you like your mother's fertilized eggs that are sitting in a clinic freezer to have inheritance rights?

Do you want to have to go underground to get your birth control pills?" Florida NOW expects all intelligent people to pledge not to sign this initiative, and to vote against it, if by some fluke it does get on the ballot. Personhood is bad for womanhood.



# NIX 6 Passing CEDAW

If the world's hopes for the Obama administration are now sinking like the Titanic, let's draw a lesson from that story and put women and children first into the lifeboats – that is, on the agenda of the current Senate session.

The new crop of conservatives elected in November 2010, have made no secret of their plans to roll back Obama's gains for women and children, cutting vital social programs. The current Senate can blunt some of those assaults by ratifying CEDAW, the global women's treaty.

CEDAW, formally known as the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women, is a landmark international agreement that affirms principles of fundamental human rights and equality for women and girls. Signed by President Jimmy Carter in 1979, it is among President Obama's top three treaty priorities after the START arms-reduction pact, which Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chairman John Kerry (D-MA) already plans to bring to a vote this fall. He should add CEDAW to that urgent calendar.

When I travel the world, I ask the women I meet what would improve their lives. The answer is a living wage job. When I arrive in a country and see children in ragged clothing begging on the streets, I ask them what they would like to do with their lives. The answer? "I wish my family could send me to school." I have witnessed first hand the need for the United States to take a leadership role in helping to build a bridge worldwide from the reality of all women and children's lives to the promise of the American dream — a stable, happy, productive life.

CEDAW ratification would strengthen the United States as a global leader in standing up for women and girls. It would amplify the U.S. voice in defending women's human rights around the world, continuing that proud tradition. Presidents Reagan, Bush and Clinton ratified similar agreements on torture, genocide and race; the American public strongly supports the principles and values of education, equality, fairness and basic human rights that CEDAW embodies.

**Ed note:** Toni wrote this in late 2010, but the struggle to get the senate to pass CEDAW continues, and the same arguments apply. Conservative religious groups are the main opposition, objecting to abortion and contraception rights among other progressive measures. It seems we have a shameful history of failure when it comes to ratifying the most fundamental human rights issues.

### **Humanism and Politics** by *Ronald A. Lindsay*

**In the United States**, politics dominates the news as we gear up for the fall elections. Not only will we have to decide on a president, but there are contests for Congress and most state legislatures, as well as state referenda on numerous issues, some of which have important public policy implications. It's at times like these when I often hear discussed the question of *whether being a humanist commits one to certain political positions*. For example, given some of the positions of the Republican Party on social issues, is it inconsistent to be both a Republican and a humanist?

First, let me make clear that I am not asking whether it is inconsistent to be an atheist and a Republican or a nontheist and a Republican. Those questions would be easy to answer. There is no inconsistency. Atheism does not entail acceptance of any political position. (Aside: this is one reason I find the existence of the National Atheist Party more than a little curious.) One can even reject the separation of church and state and be an atheist. As one (cynical) atheist once remarked to me, "Just because there is no God doesn't mean people don't need religion." I suspect many of the Wall Street financiers who donate generously to presidential campaigns of candidates supported by the religious Right have an attitude similar to this: "Of course, religion is just mumbo-jumbo, but we need it to keep the 99 percent under control."

Most humanists are atheists, but they are not merely atheists. As the Council for Secular Humanism proclaims, humanism is "beyond atheism, beyond agnosticism." In other words, being a humanist implies not only rejection of deities and spirits but also acceptance of certain fundamental principles.

Prominent among these principles are commitments to critical thinking, respect for individual autonomy, and an ethics that is broadly consequentialist in nature. Moreover, we humanists *are* firmly committed to a strict separation of church and state; among other reasons, we value individual liberty, and religious dogma has proven harmful to human interests when it has been allowed to influence public policy.

For these reasons, it would be difficult to reconcile an embrace of humanism with opposition to, for example, contraception, same-sex marriage, cohabitation without marriage, laws and regulations that protect and promote racial and gender equality, freedom of expression, and universal suffrage. If we truly respect individual autonomy, we must allow individuals the freedom to give shape and direction to their own lives, especially with respect to critical, life-altering choices, such as whether and whom to marry and whether or not to bear children. We also must ensure that individuals have the opportunity to pursue a livelihood without restrictions based on characteristics such as race or sex. It is also important that every adult have the right to participate in political life and have a role in deciding who our legislators and chief executive should be.

### What is Tampa Bay Skeptics?

Founded in 1988, Tampa Bay Skeptics is a nonprofit educational and scientific organization devoted to the critical examination of **paranormal** and **fringe-science** claims, and the dissemination of factual information about such claims. In 2004, TBS became a Special Interest Group of the **Center For Inquiry–Tampa Bay.** 

Particular areas of interest to TBS include UFOs, "psychic" power, astrology, fringe science & medicine, purported miracles and other New Age claims. Our interest in religion is restricted to claims that can be objectively tested and potentially verified, such as "weeping icons" or miraculous healings.

TBS conducts its own investigations, follows the activities of other skeptics groups, monitors the press coverage of the paranormal, and publishes a quarterly newsletter, *Tampa Bay Skeptics Report*, which is also distributed gratis to members of the press and to many other skeptics groups around the world. TBS also makes its representatives available to local and national media to provide a skeptical voice as a counterweight to the irrationalism and superstition that is increasingly prevalent in the television and print media. We have been instrumental in examining and reporting upon the Tarpon Springs "weeping icon," hypnosis, (in)famous psychics, local astrologers, etc.

TBS does not reject claims out of hand, but rather is committed to objective and critical inquiry. In this vein, we share the philosophy of the Committee for Skeptical Inquiry (CSI) -- publisher of *Skeptical Inquirer* magazine, an international organization that has nurtured the growth of local skeptics groups (such as ours) all over the world.

### TBS's "\$1,000 Challenge"

Whenever possible, TBS attempts to put claims to the test. Since 1989 we have had a standing \$1,000 Challenge available to anyone able to provide TBS with verifiable scientific proof of any paranormal phenomenon. No one has yet succeeded, but we remain open-minded (though highly skeptical) and desirous of subjecting testable paranormal claims to objective scrutiny. Should anyone ever succeed in a test for TBS, we will arrange for a test by the James Randi Educational Foundation for its \$1,000,000 Challenge.

In short, we want to help those who have grown beyond religious belief to find their philosophical home.

Those nonbelievers who are not ready, or who are unable, to "come out" can take comfort in knowing that they are not the only ones who accept the reality of a 100% natural world.

For the religious community, we want them to realize that, although nontheists reject the supernatural, we share with them compassionate human values that most religious believers embrace. In most ways, we are like them; hard working, taxpaying, moral citizens who care deeply about our families, our communities, our state and our country.

Nontheists are a large minority, larger than many minorities having much more political and cultural influence than we do. Based on the US Census Bureau estimate of Florida's 2008 population and several polls, we estimate our statewide constituency at about 2,800,000 residents (more than 400,000 in the Tampa Bay quad-county area). Tampa Bay CoR has organized to increase our standing in the marketplace of ideas and to take our rightful place at the table of acceptance and equal rights. We invite all nontheists to support us in our efforts.
