

Humanistic Psychology

During the 1950s, humanistic psychology began as a reaction to psychoanalysis and behaviorism, which dominated psychology at the time. Psychoanalysis was focused on understanding the unconscious motivations that drive behavior while behaviorism studied the conditioning processes that produce behavior. Humanist thinkers felt that both psycho-analysis and behaviorism were too pessimistic, either focusing on the most tragic of emotions or failing to take into account the role of personal choice.

Humanistic psychology has instead focused on each individual's potential and stressed the importance of growth and self-actualization. The fundamental premise of humanistic psychology is that people are innately good and that mental and social problems result from deviations from this natural tendency.

FLORIDA REPORT

Civil liberties news in the Sunshine State

Dear ACLU supporter,

Floridians had to wait in line for hours -- in some places, seven hours -- to make their voices heard and cast a vote in this year's election. It was so bad that on Election Night, the president mentioned it in his acceptance speech, telling the country that "we have to fix" the long lines.

He was right, we have to fix it. And we can.

We had warned that problems would occur back when the legislature passed and Governor Scott signed a law reducing the number of early voting days, and then fought in federal court to keep them shorter. As it became abundantly clear to the country that the lines were a problem in Florida, Governor Scott still rejected calls to extend early voting to help alleviate long lines at the polls.

Help us fix elections in our state: <u>Tell the legislature and Governor Scott how long you had to wait to vote</u>.

Public officials should work make voting easy for every citizen, and not work to put up barriers that make it harder. As we push lawmakers to restore the early voting days, we want to let them know exactly how many hours Floridians had to spend waiting in line and how many Floridians are outraged about it.

Even if your wait was short, <u>sign the petition to stand in solidarity with those who waited hours</u>.

Having your voice counted in a free and fair election is the most basic right in our democracy. Nobody should have to wait seven hours to do that. Let's fix it by restoring the early voting period.



NOW is a multi-issue political organization. NOW's self-defined role has been to initiate change for the benefit of the greatest number of people, to affect the legal and institutional structures of the society in a way that systematically expands the choices and possibilities available to all women. In this way, NOW takes action to bring women, as a class, into the mainstream of society, rather than offering aid to individual women in achieving personal solutions or temporary relief from oppression.

The Florida National Organization for Women (NOW) is in strong opposition to the Personhood Amendment ballot initiative for which the organization Personhood Florida is currently collecting signatures, according to Florida NOW president Donna Slutiak. "This amendment is ridiculous and an insult to women," Slutiak said. "The issue of Personhood would have very far reaching results, and would do more than criminalize abortion; it would also make birth control pills and the IUD illegal in the state of Florida. The amendment states that human life begins at the time when an egg is fertilized, which will also impact in-vitrofertilization clinics. How would you like your mother's fertilized eggs that are sitting in a clinic freezer to have inheritance rights?

Do you want to have to go underground to get your birth control pills?" Florida NOW expects all intelligent people to pledge not to sign this initiative, and to vote against it, if by some fluke it does get on the ballot. Personhood is bad for womanhood."

Prior to the loss of our great humanist friend Robert Byrch, I had talked about facilitating a meeting where we discuss the possibilities of humanism in film. It would be based on an introduction where I would provide a framework to consider whether a film expresses basic humanist notions and offers a way to consider the aesthetic merit of the film to be centered in these notions.

Since Robert had not set up a theme for the meeting in September and in our planning for the Tampa Humanists I will in part be helping plan the discussions for the meetings, I got agreement to move forward with my humanism and film discussion for December.

The basic consideration for whether a film touches humanism or has humanism as a centerpiece in its themes and power, we will look at the elements of the Humanist Manifesto III. This document offers six notions that can be organizing principles for our discussion.

- 1. Knowledge of the world is derived by observation, experimentation and rational analysis
- 2. Humans are an integral part of nature, the result of unguided evolutionary change.
- 3. Ethical values are derived from human need and interest as tested by
- 4. Life's fulfillment emerges from individual participation in the service of humane ideals
- 5. Humans are social by nature and find meaning in relationships
- 6. Working to benefit society maximizes individual happiness

With these notions in mind, any film can be judged as to whether it carries one or more of these themes, whether these themes are somewhat profound and whether the artistic power in the film comes from the presentation of the humanist themes.

Materials will be provided to facilitate the discussion and offer a fairly useful list of films for you to add to your Netflix piles. Several of the films from the list will be discussed in slightly more detail to offer insights into how the ideas can be applied generally for any film you may see in the future.

The original intent of the session was that it would encompass two months, the introduction which this session will be and another several months later where some experiences from those in the Meetup group can clarify whether the ideas offered were helpful.

So take the bait and please come on December 15th. Robert would have wanted you to.

For several years now, various leaders of the Freethought community in the bay area have been meeting informally to share experiences, and occasionally to coordinate plans. But recently, changing circumstances have brought additional pressure to cooperate in bringing programs and members services to an expanding movement.

At this point leaders continue to meet, and together with the various boards of directors and committees, try to develop policies that will enable every group to enhance its unique role in serving its members.

There appears to be general agreement on developing several community wide programs over the year that will allow significant speakers to be presented in our area. The costs of these programs will be shared among the organizations proportionally.

Thus substantive and exciting new activities will be offered to the Tampa Bay area that were not possible for most organizations before. We are especially grateful to the national office of the United Coalition of Reason and its director, Fred Edwords. You may recall that UCoR was the major impetus to getting a large number of billboards erected across the nation with such messages as "You can be good without God. Millions are!"

Increasingly, My Home Supports Me. Does Yours?

I think every home *should* be a productive asset. An asset that helps you succeed in life and supports you as you get older.

Unfortunately, most people don't see it that way.

They see a home as an empty shell.

Their perfect home doesn't produce. In fact, it *costs* money. Their homes only generate a return if you are lucky enough to sell it for more than you bought it.

That doesn't cut it for me. Particularly when there are a great many low cost -- in time, effort, and money -- things that can be done to increase your homes ability to produce. Simple things people can do to avoid wasting money and making themselves vulnerable to adversity. The best way to do start is to take a modular approach.

A Modular Approach to Rainwater Harvesting

I'll use rainwater harvesting to demonstrate a modular approach. Why would you harvest rainwater?

Simply, a home that *produces* water can support you during the intense heat, flooding rains, high priced water, contaminated water, and water bans that are guaranteed to be in our future. So, what would be the first module?

If you have a gutter, all you need to get started is a **rain barrel**. Want more? You can add a second barrel. Want more functionality? Add a feature like an irrigation hose. Need even more functionality? Put the rain barrel higher up, so you can use gravity to generate pressure for irrigation, plumbing, or a sprinkler. Need a bigger system? Add a 500 gallon container. Want cleaner water? Add a downspout filter. The list goes on and on. Each step is a small cost. Each step adds to the resilience of your home and the ability of your home to support you.

So, there's no reason to put this off. Take the first step. Resiliently Yours,

Course Topics:



Religious Freedom Day

Monday, January 16, 2013, marks the celebration of the birthday of Martin Luther King. However, it also marks the celebration of Religious Freedom Day. This special day honors the Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom passed by the Virginia General Assembly on January 16, 1786. (Thomas Jefferson wrote the law in 1777, and it was introduced to the Assembly in 1779.)

The law defends freedom of thought, freedom of conscience, and the separation of church and state. It was the predecessor to the First Amendment right of religious freedom. It regards religious freedom as a natural right, and maintains that no one may be forced to attend church or to support a place of worship with taxes.

In this day, it is especially important that Americans celebrate this special day. Threats to religious liberty have never been greater. Conservative Christians are attempting to prevent Muslims from building mosques.

In several U.S. states Conservative Christian politicians are attempting to pass laws against Sharia law, even though it poses no threat to the nation. Indeed, the 10th Circuit Court of Appeals recently ruled against Oklahoma's proposed anti-Sharia law, finding that Sharia was no threat to the state. Influential politicians such as Newt Gingrich have led such efforts that discourage the growth of Islam and, at least inadvertently, promote Christianity.

Please join the Institute for Science and Human Values by contacting President Obama and your U.S. senators and representatives and local politicians to ask for their support in keeping church and state separate.

On November 10, members of the Tampa Bay Skeptics, Suncoast Skeptics, and Pinellas County Skeptics met to discuss plans for developing an Independent Investigations Group (IIG) affiliate in Florida. IIG is affiliated with the Center for Inquiry (CFI) and its purpose is to promote more critical thinking and skeptical investigations into the areas of the paranormal. A \$50,000 prize is offered to anyone who can demonstrate paranormal abilities. The prize money is backed by CFI and allows local affiliates to offer a large award.

Currently, local skeptic groups are asking for any members interested in being part of this new organization to contact their group leaders. If enough interest is identified, we may move forward with developing this exciting new group in Florida. See below for TBS contacts.



What is Tampa Bay Skeptics?

Founded in 1988, Tampa Bay Skeptics is a nonprofit educational and scientific organization devoted to the critical examination of **paranormal** and **fringe-science** claims, and the dissemination of factual information about such claims. In 2004, TBS became a Special Interest Group of the **Center For Inquiry–Tampa Bay.**

Particular areas of interest to TBS include UFOs, "psychic" power, astrology, fringe science & medicine, purported miracles and other New Age claims. Our interest in religion is restricted to claims that can be objectively tested and potentially verified, such as "weeping icons" or miraculous healings.

TBS conducts its own investigations, follows the activities of other skeptics groups, monitors the press coverage of the paranormal, and publishes a quarterly newsletter, *Tampa Bay Skeptics Report*, which is also distributed gratis to members of the press and to many other skeptics groups around the world. TBS also makes its representatives available to local and national media to provide a skeptical voice as a counterweight to the irrationalism and superstition that is increasingly prevalent in the television and print media. We have been instrumental in examining and reporting upon the Tarpon Springs "weeping icon," hypnosis, (in)famous psychics, local astrologers, etc.

TBS does not reject claims out of hand, but rather is committed to objective and critical inquiry. In this vein, we share the philosophy of the Committee for Skeptical Inquiry (CSI) -- publisher of *Skeptical Inquirer* magazine, an international organization that has nurtured the growth of local skeptics groups (such as ours) all over the world.
