

Michael Hoffman, MD, a neurological scientist and surgeon from Sarasota, will discuss the physical evolution of the human brain and recent discoveries in brain science, with implications for the future of our species.

The Evolutionary Route to the Human Mind

Evolution is everywhere. Despite the best efforts of the most conservative and reactionary among us, we cannot stop changing. We are too dynamic. Our restive brains, consumed with curiosity though ambivalent about what we may find, surges closer and closer to an ever more refined and comprehensive understanding of our universe and ourselves. As we reach out to trace the nature of distant stars we are increasingly brought to realize that we are looking into the face of our own genesis.

From inert gases to human intelligence is a long journey in the unending evolution of matter, but it is one that we have made. And amidst the enormity of the problems we have created for ourselves and the pervasive cynicism about the human prospect that envelops the current conversation, we may lose sight of the power and possibility of the human being.

Dennett, Cragun, and Hoffman, will provide us with an appreciation of who and what we are, and what we may become.

One of the world's most important living philosophers, **Daniel Dennett**, is best known for his provocative and controversial arguments. He, along with Richard Dawkins, Christopher Hitchens, and Sam Harris became known as the <u>four horsemen</u> of "the new atheism."

He is credited with uncovering important aspects of the nature of consciousness the origins of which lie deep in the Paleozoic formation of early life on earth. In common human thinking and behavior lie the roots of much deeper questions about the nature and quality of our civilization.

If we are to have a future, the essence of that future will lie within the understanding of our present and its genesis in the past. Daniel Dennett offers us an opportunity to grasp the tools of our survival, not in scientific terms alone, but in the broader context of the ways of life afforded by a life of knowledge. JP

In recent years, Dennett has become outspoken in his atheism, and his 2006 book *Breaking the Spell* calls for religion to be studied through the scientific lens of evolutionary biology. Dennett regards religion as a natural -- rather than supernatural -- phenomenon, and urges schools to break the taboo against empirical examination of religion. He argues that religion's influence over human behavior is precisely what makes gaining a rational understanding of it so necessary: "If we don't understand religion, we're going to miss our chance to improve the world in the 21st century."

A prolific writer, Dennett's landmark books include *The Mind's I*, co-edited with Douglas Hofstedter, *Consciousness Explained*, and *Darwin's Dangerous Idea*. Read an excerpt from his new book, *Intuition Pumps*, in the *Guardian*

National Secular Movement Update

On January 17th, President Obama issued a proclamation on Religious Freedom Day--and for the first time in years he expressly included nonbelievers. "Today, America embraces people of all faiths and of no faith. We are Christians and Jews, Muslims and Hindus, Buddhists and Sikhs, atheists and agnostics. [...] What makes us American is our adherence to shared ideals -- freedom, equality, justice, and our right as a people to set our own course," the proclamation read in part.

The president included the nod to nontheists in large part due to a strengthened relationship between the White House and the Secular Coalition for America.

On Monday the Secular Coalition met with White House staff to brief them on our recently released Model Secular Policy Guide, which covers dozens of topics important to the nontheistic community. With the State of the Union address fast approaching on January 28, we have also been working with White House staff to encourage the recognition of nonbelievers and an accurate portrayal of religious liberty in the president's speech.

Wednesday, Feb. 5: Julie Langford (History) Maternal Megalomania: Julia Domna and the Imperial Politics of Motherhood. Grace Allen Room (Library)3:00pm, Ancient authors accuse Julia Domna, wife of Roman emperor Septimius Severus (193–211), of ambition unforgivable in a woman, of instigating civil war to place her sons on the throne, and of resorting to incest to maintain her hold on power. In imperial propaganda, however, Julia Domna was honored with unprecedented titles that celebrated her maternity, whether it was in the role of mother to her two sons (both future emperors) or as the metaphorical mother to the empire.

In *Maternal Megalomania*, Julie Langford unmasks the maternal titles and honors of Julia Domna as a campaign on the part of the administration to garner support for Severus and his sons. Langford explores how her image was tailored toward different populations, including the military, the Senate, and the people of Rome, and how these populations responded to propaganda about the empress. She employs Julia Domna as a case study to explore the creation of ideology between the emperor and his subjects.

For several years now, various leaders of the Freethought community in the bay area have been meeting informally to share experiences, and occasionally to coordinate plans. But recently, changing circumstances have brought additional pressure to cooperate in bringing programs and members services to an expanding movement.

At this point leaders continue to meet, and together with the various boards of directors and committees, try to develop policies that will enable every group to enhance its unique role in serving its members.

There appears to be general agreement on developing several community wide programs over the year that will allow significant speakers to be presented in our area. The costs of these programs will be shared among the organizations proportionally.

Thus substantive and exciting new activities will be offered to the Tampa Bay area that were not possible for most organizations before.

We are especially grateful to the national office of the United Coalition of Reason and its director, Fred Edwords. You may recall that UCoR was the major impetus to getting a large number of billboards erected across the nation with such messages as "You can be good without God. Millions are!"

New research by a team of scientists looking at the impact of cloud behavior on planetary climate change says that "the worst" and "catastrophic" predictions offered by previous studies on the rate of global warming this century are much more likely than the less severe scenarios offered by others.

According to Dr. Steven Sherwood, lead author of the study and a specialist in climate and cloud formations at the University of New South Wales in Australia, cloud patterns in an increasingly warming world are likely to exacerbate global temperature increases overall, not mitigate warming as some models have suggested.

The research <u>predicts</u> that global temperatures will likely rise at least 4°C by 2100 and potentially more than 8°C by 2200 if carbon dioxide emissions are not reduced and serious actions by governments and society are not taken.

Such drastic increases, Sherwood told the *Guardian*, would be "catastrophic rather than simply dangerous."

Specifically, the study looked at how already warming temperatures impact the ability of clouds to form at high altitudes, because that ability can greatly impact the way in which large clouds help the planet reflect or absorb the sun's heat.

By tackling that problem, say Sherwood and his colleagues, their research "cracks open one of the biggest problems in climate science." As the *Syndey Morning Herald* reports:

Will Steffen, an adjunct professor at Australian National University and a member of the Climate Council, said the paper was "right out on the forefront of the sort of research we need to do on clouds".

"The more we get research like from [Professor Sherwood] and his group, the more confidence we'll have in being able to say where in that range [the temperature increase] is likely to fall."


The CO2 level of the atmosphere in 2012 was 393 parts per million, or 41 per cent higher than in pre-industrial times, the World Meteorological Organization said. The level is rising at an accelerating rate - more than two parts per million a year - as humans burn more fossil fuels and cut down forests.

Global temperatures have risen about 0.8 degrees since about 1880, with system lags and air pollution reflecting sunlight partly explaining why the rise has not been higher. "We've been hoping for the best and not planning for the worst," Professor Sherwood said. "And now it's looking like the best is not very likely."

In 2012, a <u>study by the World Bank</u>—an institution not typically known for sounding the alarm over industrial, human-caused global warming—also said that a 4°C temperature rise was not only possible, but likely if humanity did not change course. According to Kim Yong Kim, the bank's president, the resulting impacts of a planet that warm would likely "make the world our children inherit a completely different world than we are living in today."

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





Why do we Fight?



There was a great article in The Atlantic magazine back in November about the biological foundation of natural morality. As a Humanist, I obviously found the article fascination. In a nutshell, he says that yes, we are wired for morality and we all have an innate sense of justice and that this is actually pretty uniform around the world. The problem is that we like to think we have different and "better" moral values than other tribes. It's what makes our tribe better than others. And yes, we Humanists do this too - obviously our moral system is better than everyone else's and obviously they should all conform to our way of thinking about morality rationally. That would stop all the conflicts. Except it wouldn't.

According to this author, Robert Wright, a senior fellow at the New America Foundation, the problem is that our sense of justice and morality is tied to our sense that if a wrong has occurred, someone should be punished for it and that our bias to see our tribe as more virtuous than others and this bias prevents us from understanding our own role in conflicts. In other words, when a conflict occurs, we humans tend to think we are right and the other side is wrong and this causes us to develop confirmation bias which helps us find evidence to support our sense of moral outrage and we ignore the evidence that shows that, just maybe, we might have had a hand in the whole affair.

The proposed solution for this isn't to create a new meta-morality that everyone can agree on because, in reality, most moral systems are the same. The solution is apparently to encourage people into meta-cognition - which is to be aware of your own biases when conflict arises and to actively work past your sense of moral outrage to consider your own actions as being, at least somewhat, partially causal. In other words, doubt your own sense of moral outrage and your own sense of injustice.


All of which is a long winded way of saying - stop thinking tribally. Which is where Humanism comes in. Yes, we have an awesome moral code. But you know what really makes the philosophy powerful? Is that the very name of the philosophy, Humanism, is a reminder that we need to look past our tribal impulses to see others we are in conflict with as part of our tribe.

Humanist need to help people think more clearly, certainly, but that doesn't mean we need to spend our time convincing people to abandon their religious moralities. It's actually way easier and way more effective to encourage them to think more humanistically and less tribally about justice and responsibility. The Limits of our knowledge By Frank Prahl

Humans have often evoked gods to explain most everything they did not understand. Science has been steadily eroding this practice, now mostly referred to as "God of the gaps." While viewing Youtube videos of conferences and other speeches, I was struck by another useful phrase, "Limits of their knowledge," used by Neil DeGrasse Tyson when he was talking about Intelligent Design, which he labeled a "philosophy of ignorance."



Basically, what he said was that even those we can think of as great scientists; Ptolemy, Galileo, Newton and Huygens were his examples that did not evoke a god as long as they understood a happening or process. At the limits of their knowledge, when they could not explain more with the available evidence, only then did they postulate that a god had possibly created or directed the not-understood event. 100 years after Newton, Laplace had worked out the remaining problems Newton left unanswered and was asked by Napoleon what role God played in the orbits of the planets, he replied that he "had no need for that hypothesis."

This concept of "**limits of our knowledge**" needs to be emphasized in schools along with "skepticism" in all classes as a part of "critical thinking skills." This phrase seems less confrontational than the "God of the gaps" phrase we often use. God or a Creator need not be mentioned in most studies, so as not to upset theists. There is nothing wrong, and is more honest, in saying "I don't know" instead of invoking a god or creator. At least this leaves open other possible explanations. And, this is what science is all about; searching for natural, not supernatural explanations.

A focus for February by Rick O'Keefe, branch coordinator, Center for Inquiry–Tampa Bay

In February we Americans take time for reflecting on our presidential history. Because education and critical thinking are bedrocks of Humanism and of Center for Inquiry, I share a thought from Abraham Lincoln, excerpted from his *Discoveries and Inventions*. In that lecture, Lincoln expounded on a handful of what he considered to be major events that propelled civilization forward. This one is apropos.

"But, to return to the consideration of printing, it is plain that it is but the other half -- and in real utility, the better half -of writing; and that both together are but the assistants of speech in the communication of thoughts between man and man. When man was possessed of speech alone, the chances of invention, discovery, and improvement, were very limited; but by the introduction of each of these, they were greatly multiplied. When writing was invented, any important observation, likely to lead to a discovery, had at least a chance of being written down, and consequently, a better chance of never been forgotten; and of being seen, and reflected upon, by a much greater number of persons; and thereby the chances of a valuable hint being caught, proportionally augmented. By this means the observation of a single individual might lead to an important invention, years, and even centuries after he was dead. In one word, by means of writing, the seeds of invention were more permanently preserved, and more widely sown. And yet, for the three thousand years during which printing remained undiscovered after writing was in use, it was only a small portion of the people who could write, or read writing; and consequently the field of invention, though much extended, still continued very limited. At length printing came. It gave ten thousand copies of any written matter, quite as cheaply as then were given before; and consequently a thousand minds were brought into the field where there was but one before. This was a great gain; and history shows a great change corresponding to it, in point of time. I will venture to consider it, the true termination of that period called "the dark ages." Discoveries, inventions, and improvements followed rapidly, and have been increasing their rapidity ever since. The effects could not come, all at once. It required time to bring them out; and they are still coming. The *capacity* to read could not be multiplied as fast as the *means* of reading. Spellingbooks just began to go into the hands of the children; but the teachers were not very numerous, or very competent; so that it is safe to infer they did not advance so speedily as they do now-a-days. It is very probable – almost certain – that the great mass of men, at that time, were utterly unconscious, that their *conditions* or their *minds* were capable of improvement. They not only looked upon the educated few as superior beings; but they supposed themselves to be naturally incapable of rising to equality. To emancipate the mind from this false and underestimate of itself is the great task which printing came into the world to perform. It is difficult for us, now and here, to conceive how strong this slavery of the mind was; and how long it did, of necessity, take, to break its shackles, and to get a habit of freedom of thought, established. It is, in this connection, a curious fact that a new country is most favorable -- almost necessary -- to the immancipation of thought, and the consequent advancement of civilization and the arts."


