



Austerity: Intimations of a New Way of Life.

Lessons from the newly manufactured Greek Tragedy... Discussion led by: *Mihalis Halkides, Ph.D., & Marios Psomas*

All of us face multiple systemic challenges and crises with potentially detrimental impact for our lives. These challenges cannot be analyzed outside their context--today's global relations and their consequences.

We witness on a daily basis the results of the economic crises of the capitalist financial system; production, distribution, and consumption controls over limited resources; population issues; worldwide climate change, and so on. As these crises hit closer to home, we are compelled to make sense of them. No longer can we afford to claim that it's "all Greek to us."

The 'Imposed Austerity' and 'Forced Privatizations' felt harshly across Europe nowadays, from Greece to Spain, Italy, and beyond, are the start of a tsunami that will be felt worldwide, with dire consequences. What are the possibilities for progressive change? what is the context of such a change? what can we learn beyond the Greek and southern European situation?

As human beings, we are everywhere clever and capable, and moreover we have stored a vast reserve of knowledge and experience that may be used in rejecting the present regime, and creating a good way of life.

Though our curiosity may be powerful, we cannot peer reliably more than a few years into the future. Uncertainty builds the further we try to ascertain the fate of our species. But for this immediate future, which is ours to create, we have living examples of what others have experienced


and how they have responded. We are fortunate to have two observers who are quite familiar with the situation in Greece, being Greek themselves. As they speak and read Greek fluently, they have heard many perspectives and analyses from Greek commentators, scientists, and politicians, as well as many citizens. FLORIDA REPORT

Civil liberties news in the Sunshine State

Dear ACLU supporter,

Over the last two weeks, thousands of Floridians have signed our petition urging Senators Nelson and Rubio to pressure the Department of Homeland Security to end the controversial immigration enforcement program which has led to thousands of deportations from Florida. The fate of the program, known as 287(g), which opens the door to racial profiling and makes communities less safe, could be decided at the beginning of next week.

Groups across the country and in Florida are flooding the White House switchboard with calls for an end to the program. We need your voice: <u>Call the White House</u> today to tell President Obama to end the racial profiling program.

The 287(g) program lets local law enforcement agencies enter into agreements with ICE to enforce federal immigration laws and detain people for deportation, often for minor offenses like traffic violations. The Collier County and Jacksonville Sheriffs' participation in the program has led to the deportation of thousands of individuals, increased the potential for racial profiling, and eroded trust between law enforcement and minority communities here in Florida.

Thousands of you signed the petition we sent to Senators Rubio and Nelson calling for an end to the program when the agreements expire this month, and ACLU leaders delivered 4,500 more signatures to the White House on Thursday. Now, members of organizations across the country are joining together to call on the White House to end the program when the Department of Homeland Security reviews the agreements on the 17th.

Calling takes only a few minutes, and your voice will be echoed by the countless others taking action to end the program. Join the growing chorus of voices calling for an end to the program now.

Austerity: American Style

Last year, almost one in four children lived in a family that regularly had difficulty affording sufficient food, according to the US department of agriculture. On the other end of life, <u>8.3 million</u> people over 60 in 2010 faced the threat of hunger, up 78% from a decade earlier – yet another reason to oppose the proposed <u>fiscal</u> cliff cuts in social security or Medicare.

Hunger and malnutrition lead to a broad array of health problems, ranging from reduced immunity to disease or even organ failure. For children, poor nutrition can severely stunt cognitive development and growth. For adults and seniors, the consequences can include more chronic illnesses and shorter life spans.

Over <u>20 million Americans live in extreme poverty</u> – with cash incomes as low as \$10,000 a year for a family of four. Is it any wonder that the US has the third highest poverty rate out of 30 leading industrial nations?

The problem is exacerbated by decades of economic and political policies that have resulted in a massive shift of national wealth from working people to the corporate boardrooms and the yacht owners. One result: real wage growth for workers has stagnated for 30 years; median household income has steadily fallen since the Wall Street produced economic crash of 2008. Much of the limited job growth since then has been in the lowest wage sectors, primarily food service and retail.

Sadly, the issue remained almost as invisible on the 2012 campaign trail as it was when Michael Harrington shocked the nation in 1962 with his book, *The Other America*. But it is not a surprise to those who, every day, see the faces of poverty and the suffering of families left behind – even as corporate profits once again soar and the parties and good times are back on Wall Street.

With all the enormous wealth in our nation, we really can do something about poverty – as well as the overall economic morass that continues to plague not just the unemployed, or those working two or three jobs, and flipping hamburgers in Main Street towns and cities from coast to coast.

There is a solution. Everyone deserves a good job at living wages, guaranteed healthcare for all based on patient need, not on ability to pay, and equal access to quality education. And now, with cuts to social security on the table, (2.5 - 6%) and despite the push by some politicians in Washington and many state capitals to enact more austerity programs on already hard-hit communities, there is a simple way to keep anti-poverty programs in place and pay for them.

A modest tax Wall Street on speculation, embodied in <u>HR 6411</u>, <u>authored by Representative Keith Ellison</u>, could generate up to \$350 billion every year, an amount that could save over 1.7 million homes from foreclosure, or finance 9 million new jobs at current average wage levels. Or it could fund the food plans of 24 million families of four for a year, or lift all 3.8 million female-headed households out of poverty for nearly a decade. Increasingly, the "Other America" is becoming all of us. It is up to all of us to end our national shame.

NOW is a multi-issue political organization. NOW's self-defined role has been to initiate change for the benefit of the greatest number of people, to affect the legal and institutional structures of the society in a way that systematically expands the choices and possibilities available to all women. In this way, NOW takes action to bring women, as a class, into the mainstream of society, rather than offering aid to individual women in achieving personal solutions or temporary relief from oppression.

The Florida National Organization for Women (NOW) is in strong opposition to the Personhood Amendment ballot initiative for which the organization Personhood Florida is currently collecting signatures, according to Florida NOW president Donna Slutiak. "This amendment is ridiculous and an insult to women," Slutiak said. "The issue of Personhood would have very far reaching results, and would do more than criminalize abortion; it would also make birth control pills and the IUD illegal in the state of Florida. The amendment states that human life begins at the time when an egg is fertilized, which will also impact in-vitrofertilization clinics. How would you like your mother's fertilized eggs that are sitting in a clinic freezer to have inheritance rights?

Do you want to have to go underground to get your birth control pills?" Florida NOW expects all intelligent people to pledge not to sign this initiative, and to vote against it, if by some fluke it does get on the ballot. Personhood is bad for womanhood."

For several years now, various leaders of the Freethought community in the bay area have been meeting informally to share experiences, and occasionally to coordinate plans. But recently, changing circumstances have brought additional pressure to cooperate in bringing programs and members services to an expanding movement.

At this point leaders continue to meet, and together with the various boards of directors and committees, try to develop policies that will enable every group to enhance its unique role in serving its members.

There appears to be general agreement on developing several community wide programs over the year that will allow significant speakers to be presented in our area. The costs of these programs will be shared among the organizations proportionally.

Thus substantive and exciting new activities will be offered to the Tampa Bay area that were not possible for most organizations before. We are especially grateful to the national office of the United Coalition of Reason and its director, Fred Edwords. You may recall that UCoR was the major impetus to getting a large number of billboards erected across the nation with such messages as "You can be good without God. Millions are!"

TBCoR is an alliance of groups identified with the freethought / Humanist /Atheist movement.

As this momentum continues to grow, we will keep you informed of developments. JP

Ours is a challenging path, assailed on one hand by those who dismiss our concerns as groundless or Malthusian and, on the other, by those who believe the situation is hopeless and therefore our efforts are irrelevant. And that's just in the context of the sustainability debate, one in which relatively few politicians, pundits, and the general public are even engaged. Bigger still are the entrenched interests who can and do expend tremendous financial resources and political leverage to keep our society's collective pedal to the fossil fuel metal. (It's hard not to feel chagrin to discover that Rex Tillerson, the CEO of ExxonMobil, <u>made</u> the equivalent of PCI's entire annual budget in just seven days of work last year.) And biggest, of course, are the very systems—food, transport, land use, buildings, economics, education, governance—that fossil fuels have built over many decades, and which cannot be remade quickly or easily.

In the face of such odds, why bother? Because we must. But it's not just that. It's because, rightly or wrongly, I have hope. That hope is based on two things:

1. The still small but rapidly growing movement of individuals and <u>communities building resilience</u> in response to current shocks and preparation for future. These early actors are working to reduce consumption, produce local food and energy, invest in local economies, and preserve local ecosystems.


2. A belief that humans, while lousy at proactively mitigating hardship, are a pretty adaptive species once the proverbial s%#t hits the fan.

It's the combination of these that provides <u>a framework of sorts</u> for PCI's own efforts, modeled (ironically enough) on the words of Milton Friedman: "Only a crisis—actual or perceived—produces real change. When the crisis occurs, the actions that are taken depend on the ideas that are lying around. That, I believe, is our basic function: to develop alternatives to existing policies, to keep them alive and available until the politically impossible becomes politically inevitable." *Asher Miller*





Religious Freedom Day

Monday, January 16, 2013, marks the celebration of the birthday of Martin Luther King. However, it also marks the celebration of Religious Freedom Day. This special day honors the Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom passed by the Virginia General Assembly on January 16, 1786. (Thomas Jefferson wrote the law in 1777, and it was introduced to the Assembly in 1779.)

The law defends freedom of thought, freedom of conscience, and the separation of church and state. It was the predecessor to the First Amendment right of religious freedom. It regards religious freedom as a natural right, and maintains that no one may be forced to attend church or to support a place of worship with taxes.

In this day, it is especially important that Americans celebrate this special day. Threats to religious liberty have never been greater. Conservative Christians are attempting to prevent Muslims from building mosques.

In several U.S. states Conservative Christian politicians are attempting to pass laws against Sharia law, even though it poses no threat to the nation. Indeed, the 10th Circuit Court of Appeals recently ruled against Oklahoma's proposed anti-Sharia law, finding that Sharia was no threat to the state. Influential politicians such as Newt Gingrich have led such efforts that discourage the growth of Islam and, at least inadvertently, promote Christianity.

What is Tampa Bay Skeptics?

Founded in 1988, Tampa Bay Skeptics is a nonprofit educational and scientific organization devoted to the critical examination of **paranormal** and **fringe-science** claims, and the dissemination of factual information about such claims. In 2004, TBS became a Special Interest Group of the **Center For Inquiry–Tampa Bay**.

Particular areas of interest to TBS include UFOs, "psychic" power, astrology, fringe science & medicine, purported miracles and other New Age claims. Our interest in religion is restricted to claims that can be objectively tested and potentially verified, such as "weeping icons" or miraculous healings.

TBS conducts its own investigations, follows the activities of other skeptics groups, monitors the press coverage of the paranormal, and publishes a quarterly newsletter, *Tampa Bay Skeptics Report*, which is also distributed gratis to members of the press and to many other skeptics groups around the world. TBS also makes its representatives available to local and national media to provide a skeptical voice as a counterweight to the irrationalism and superstition that is increasingly prevalent in the television and print media. We have been instrumental in examining and reporting upon the Tarpon Springs "weeping icon," hypnosis, (in)famous psychics, local astrologers, etc.

TBS does not reject claims out of hand, but rather is committed to objective and critical inquiry. In this vein, we share the philosophy of the Committee for Skeptical Inquiry (CSI) -- publisher of *Skeptical Inquirer* magazine, an international organization that has nurtured the growth of local skeptics groups (such as ours) all over the world.
