According to the April 6th Tampa Bay Times: FRIEDLEY, Dale L. 63, of St. Petersburg, passed away Sunday, March 30, 2014. Survived by brothers, Darl and Dean; sister, D'Ann; and friends.

Dale had in fact, a great many friends. He shared his many interests notably Film, philosophy, journalism, art, and the broad swath of knowledge represented by his interest in Humanism. Despite the near constant pain of his condition, he illuminated our world in ways we shall always remember.

"Coming from a radical atheist background and a love of philosophy, humanism may be the best great hope for a better world. My humanism comes theoretically from a Jeremy Bentham utilitarianism but I have honed in on empathy as another great hope."

News of the death of our friend, Dale Friedley has set me to thinking about the matter of death itself. Most of the rational world knows that as individuals, we are a relatively short lived phenomenon. Yet within our lives, is a whole universe of understanding, interconnected, but leaving the ends of many threads still unwoven.

We embrace science, it's method and knowledge, and we regard it as far superior to that unsavory intermesh of myths, superstition, and willful self deceit that is the substance of religion.

But the trump card of religion, its point of honor and compelling promise is the possibility of immortality. Pascal's famous wager leaves open the possibility that it may well be a monstrous hoax, but tempts us with the possibility of its truth.

As human beings, we have demonstrated in every generation a willingness to embrace that tempting lie, even as the damming evidence of its falsity continues to accumulate. For the most part that willingness has been mandated by the misery, hopelessness and despair of everyday life for most of our fellow humans over the entire time of our consciousness as a species.

But now things are different. Widespread education, communication, and culture have spread throughout the world. What we may know about our world and ourselves is limited only by our individual interest and ability. Virtually all the history, culture, and knowledge of the past and present is "online" and freely available.

An examination of our treasure requires us to have and exercise our inherent capacity for rational thought, that when coupled with a rigorous education results in critical thinking, logic, cultural knowledge, and the systematic rejection of one dimensional hamburgers.

Dale was a wry, self deprecating person who was quirky, clever, well educated and the kind of perfect companion for an evening's conversation that one might wish for but seldom find.

He had the misfortune to have the kind of illness that was an unrelenting source of pain, a true test of humanity shining through that intensity, and a triumph of human endurance of which we seem to have had more than our share lately.

Dale knew death and was private in it, but he shared the part of himself that we will always remember, and that is now part of us. *Jim Peterson*

GOOD WITHOUT A GOD

On April 7th, over 25 humanist & atheists joined over 3000 religious participants at Tropicana Field for the FAST Social Justice Rally. The 10th annual Nehemiah rally was the largest, with plans for more attendees next year. Issues included juvenile justice, elementary school reading, dental



care for disadvantage youth, and job opportunities for qualified ex-felons. FAST works year round with government leaders to brainstorm no net cost solutions to Pinellas county problems. Hillsborough, Pasco, and Polk have similar programs.

The annual cycle starts again in Fall, with small home-size meetings to discuss issues for next year. All COR are invited to participate and also join in the detail work groups that both research and brainstorm solutions and monitor the integrity of previous year promises.

Civil liberties news in the Sunshine State

The summary of the landmark Senate report detailing rampant CIA torture during the Bush years has finally made it to President Obama's desk. But the White House has said that—incredibly—the CIA will take the lead in redacting that summary report before we can read it.

Do you notice a conflict of interest there? The CIA is the agency that **tortured** people, **lied** about it, and then even **spied** on the computers of the Senate committee staffers who were investigating it

Our lawyers are confirming that the torture report summary will be released in a few weeks. And if it isn't censored, the details in it could blow the lid off the vast extent of CIA brutality since September 11th. But if the CIA has its way, we may never know the full truth

Sign the petition now calling on President Obama to stop the CIA from censoring the Senate's torture report before it's too late.

President Obama has the authority to decide what minimal redactions, if any, will be made to the summary report. The worst thing he could do is let the CIA decide instead.

This is the same president that has claimed that his administration is the "most transparent in history." So we need to publicly hold him to his word.

A new Legal Hope

For controlling Carbon Emissions


While industry scoffs at the importance of climate-change lawsuits. Big Carbon is thought to be taking them very seriously in private especially after a federal appeals court found in 2005 that US cities and even individuals suffering economic and other damages from climate change had standing to sue under the National Environmental Policy Act. The plaintiffs included the cities of Oakland, California, and Boulder, Colorado, along with several members of Greenpeace and Friends of the Earth, ranging from a maple tree farmer to a marine biologist. An analyst with the conservative Pacific Legal Foundation called the idea of such a lawsuit "nuts"—but within four years, a federal judge had ruled for the plaintiffs, opening the courthouse doors to new classes of litigants.

Some legal analysts believe that fossil fuel producers could be vulnerable to fraud or civil conspiracy charges if it can be legally proved that companies like ExxonMobil and Peabody Coal spent millions funding climate-change-denying organizations like the Competitive Enterprise Institute and the Greening Earth Society, while internally acknowledging that the science supporting anthropogenic (i.e., human-caused) climate change was a settled issue. That could put Big Carbon in roughly the same position as Big Tobacco was in the early 1990s, when cigarette makers continued to cultivate public doubt about their product's harmfulness long after they had accepted that it was addictive and deadly. As the tobacco suits lurched forward, documents—as well as some infamous congressional testimony—proved the industry's bad faith, swaying public opinion against tobacco. It was that, along with the massive wave of lawsuits by all fifty state attorneys general, that helped persuade Congress to bring the cigarette makers under the federal regulatory umbrella.

In the case of energy, anthropogenic climate change has been accepted science since at least 1990—meaning that the coal, oil and gas industries have been on notice for at least twenty-five years that they are making the planet uninhabitable. It was also in the early '90s that the energy industry began to aggressively push what it pretended was a "counter science" of climate-change denial, even as it continued billboards erected across the nation with such messages as "You can to dump a substantial portion of total historic CO2 emissions into the earth's atmosphere.

The mission of the Center for Inquiry is to foster a secular society based on science, reason, freedom of inquiry, and humanist values.

To oppose and supplant the mythological narratives of the past, and the dogmas of the present, the world needs an institution devoted to promoting science, reason, freedom of inquiry, and humanist values. The Center for Inquiry is that institution.

At the Center for Inquiry, we believe that evidence-based reasoning, in which humans work together Rick O'Keefe to address common concerns, is critical for modern world civilization. Moreover, unlike many other institutions, we maintain that scientific methods and reasoning should be utilized in examining the claims of both pseudoscience and religion. We reject mysticism and blind faith. No topic should be placed off limits to scrutiny—certainly not fringe science and religion, which have an enormous influence on beliefs and conduct.

We also maintain that values are properly the subject of study and discussion as much as empirical claims. The Center for Inquiry studies and promotes human values based on a naturalistic outlook. Ideological doctrine and religious dogma have no more right to dictate our moral norms than they do to influence scientific research.

The Center for Inquiry supports research, but our mission activities go far beyond sound scholarship. The Center for Inquiry, and its affiliates, the Committee for Skeptical Inquiry and the Council for Secular Humanism, also carry out their work through education, publishing, advocacy, and social services. The Center for Inquiry has established dozens of regional centers and communities, which provide a means of delivering educational programs and services on a local level and provide a venue for like-minded individuals to meet and share experiences. In addition, the Center for Inquiry has affiliates and sponsors programs in many different countries. A secular society ultimately should embrace all of humanity, not just selected countries.

In aiming to foster a secular society, we do not seek to abridge the rights of believers. We vigorously object to government support of religion and the use of religious dogma to justify public policy; we do not oppose the free exercise of religion. The secular society we are building is a community of reason and compassion in which the dignity and fundamental rights of all individuals are respected.

Fostering a secular society requires attention to many specific goals, but three goals in particular represent the focus of our activities:

- 1. an end to the influence that religion and pseudoscience have on public policy.
- 2. an end to the privileged position that religion and pseudoscience continue to enjoy in many societies,
- 3. an end to the stigma attached to being a nonbeliever, whether the nonbeliever describes her/himself as an atheist, agnostic, humanist, freethinker or skeptic.


