HUMANIST CHARITIES Click to connect! The National Day of Prayer was made an official annual day of observance by Congress and President Truman in 1952. On this day each year the President issues a proclamation recognizing the celebration and asking Americans to pray, and government officials at the federal, state, and local levels participate in prayer ceremonies as representatives of the government. Obviously, many Americans and groups like the AHA oppose this government-sanctioned religious event as we feel it violates the First Amendment and excludes non-religious Americans.




The National Day of Reason was created to call attention to

this unconstitutional event, in addition to celebrating reason and its societal benefits. Every year we call upon government officials at all levels of public service and of all political parties to issue a proclamation showing their commitment to the separation of church and state.

Last year, the Governors of Rhode Island and Nebraska joined with several mayors and Members of Congress in recognizing the National Day of Reason. This was a historic achievement for the humanist movement, as it showed that government officials recognized our concerns about the National Day of Prayer and were eager to work with us in celebrating a more inclusive holiday.

Religious humanists, secular humanists and atheists can all agree that this life in this world is our central and defining focus. Each one of us is responsible for human affairs, other beings, and the resources of our shared planet. 

It's a simple word whose curious reverse spelling is "live." And while the question of whom exactly it might be who knows "what evil lurks in the hearts of men..." we know it is no mere shadow. In fact, there is every reason to believe it is us, and that it is according to the great philosopher, Pogo, our worst and most intimate enemy.

It is for the cause of rooting out evil that millions are made to die and suffer through wars of religion and politics. It may well be observed that most great catastrophes are visited by us upon ourselves in the interest of imposing the "good" and vanquishing evil.

And yet evil is an alien presence in the mind of the popular imagination. Leaders and personalities associated with causes and events of great trauma become disassociated from our species as if they were not members of the human race. We do not recognize them as one of us. Maybe we should. Perhaps we need to identify the source of evil as nothing more exotic then the vagaries of genetics in the presence of the evolutionary conflicts of our culture as it encounters inevitable contradictions of growth.

But we need to know the nature of our discontents and clarify with more precision the identity of our faults if we are to ease the pressure of our enduring anxiety.

Climate change, along with the depletion of oil, coal, and gas dictate that we will inevitably move away from our profound societal reliance on fossil fuels; but just how big a transformation will this be? While many policy-makers assume that renewable energy sources will provide an easy "plug-and-play" solution, author **Richard Heinberg** suggests instead that we are in for a wild

ride; a "civilization reboot" on a scale similar to the agricultural and industrial revolutions.

Afterburn consists of 15 essays exploring various aspects of the 21st century migration away from fossil fuels including:

- Short-term political and economic factors that impede broad-scale, organized efforts to adapt.
- The origin of longer-term trends (such as consumerism), that have created a way of life that seems "normal" to most Americans, but is actually unprecedented, highly fragile, and unsustainable.
- Potential opportunities and sources of conflict that are likely to emerge.

From the inevitability and desirability of more locally organized economies, to the urgent need to preserve our recent cultural achievements and the futility of pursuing economic growth above all, *Afterburn* offers cutting-edge perspectives and insights that challenge conventional thinking about our present, our future, and the choices in our hands.

The advent of fossil fuels changed the world profoundly (giving us everything from plastics and automobiles to global warming); the inevitable and rapidly approaching end of the oil-coal-and-gas era will likewise bring overwhelming transformation in its wake. My new book *Afterburn* explores that transformation—its opportunities and challenges—in sixteen essays that address subjects as varied as energy politics, consumerism, localism, the importance of libraries, and oil price volatility.

Afterburn is a book of "greatest hits"—that is, popular essays that have been previously published—similar in that respect to an earlier book of mine, *Peak Everything* (2007). Like that previous collection, this one has been carefully selected and arranged, and features an all -new Introduction.




Challenge, Create, Connect: Our new motto focuses our commitment to bring the beauty, values, and lessons of the humanities to USF and our community.





For many people, atheism represents the most focused and powerful criticism of the philosophical worldview with which most of us were raised. It is liberating for the same reason it attracts the enmity of those who are committed to the closed and changeless narrative of unexamined traditional beliefs.



Happiness Through Humanism: Excerpts: Happiness in the moment



While our moment-to-moment happiness depends

on how we are treated by others, our larger sense of purpose in life is our own doing.

There was a recent study about every day morality – see <u>report on it</u>. What they found is that people receive and commit more moral acts than immoral acts, but we are twice as likely to hear about immoral acts. Something we all know but it's nice to have it validated by actual data.

The other big finding is that if you are a recipient of a moral act, you are more likely to act morally yourself within the next hour. This is something the scientists call "moral contagion." In other words, being kind encourages more kindness in the world.

What has this got to do with happiness? Well, it turns out that being treated morally increases our happiness. No surprise there. But when you combine this with acting morally encouraging more moral behavior, you start to see the scientific underpinnings of the golden rule. You behave well because it encourages other people to behave well and when other people behave well towards you, it makes you feel happy.

What is really interesting is people who behave morally experience a big increase in their sense of purpose in life. Having a larger sense of purpose in your life not only feels good, it reduces stress improves your health and increases your lifespan. Apparently science backs up the Humanist approach to life. Be a good person, help other people be good too.

And these processes are really helpful. They can help us get a lot of stuff done very quickly and with minimal error; precisely because – they are done the same way every time.


Processes are only a problem when we need to change them. And suddenly all heck breaks loose.

Former Rep. Allen West: Church/State Separation is Responsible for Football Injuries

Last week, former **Rep. Allen West** spoke to a conservative group in Texas about the Freedom From Religion Foundation's <u>battle against formal pre-game prayers</u> at public school football games.

West explained that he <u>never got injured</u> when he played high school football because there was a team prayer before the games:

Now see, I remember growing up in the inner city of Atlanta, Georgia. I went to Grady High School and I played football. And we didn't have all this high-speed gear and everything like that. There was no such thing about "targeting." I mean, you were not a tough football player unless you *did* try to hit someone head-on.

And even in high school, before every game at Grady Stadium, the pastor would come down and pray over that football game. I don't remember catastrophic injuries. I don't remember anyone getting carted off that field paralyzed.

Miranda Blue at Right Wing Watch <u>notes that football injuries</u> have been <u>going on for a long time</u> — far before the Supreme Court banned <u>school-sponsored Bible readings</u> at public schools.

Also, keep in mind that professional football teams <u>have their</u> <u>own chaplains</u>... and the NFL isn't exactly known for its <u>injury</u> <u>prevention</u>.

Not that West cares. Even when he's not in office, he's still pandering to religious conservatives with lies.

Mischief follows in partisan Bible Translations

Remember Junias? He was the imaginary male apostle with the unique and implausible name. "Junias" was invented by patriarchal Bible translators and inserted into the text of scripture because those translators didn't like what the text actually said.

The text in question, Romans 16:7, says:

Greet Andronicus and Junia, my relatives who were in prison with me; they are prominent among the apostles, and they were in Christ before I was.

Junia is a *woman's* name and it just wouldn't do to have people reading about a woman who was an apostle — let alone one who was "*prominent* among the apostles." For patriarchal Christians who insisted on a maleonly hierarchy, Junia was intolerable. So they got rid of her. They translated her into an imaginary man with an imaginary name.

Politics — specifically, the political desire to control women — shaped the translation of that text. The translators *changed the words of the Bible* to make it seem like it supported their political agenda. They changed the words of the Bible so that others reading it would not be able to see that its actual words *challenged* and *contradicted* their political agenda.

This is something that happens sometimes.

Let me share another, more recent, example. Junias was invented and inserted into the Bible a long time ago, but this alteration of the text occurred in my lifetime. As I noted earlier, this change in the words and meaning of the Bible is more recent than the introduction of the Happy Meal.

CBC News reports: The Supreme Court of Canada has ruled the municipal council in the Quebec town of Saguenay cannot open its meetings with a prayer.

In a unanimous decision today, the country's top court said reciting a Catholic prayer at council meetings infringes on freedom of conscience and religion.

The ruling puts an end to an eight-year legal battle that began with a complaint filed by atheist Alain Simoneau and a secular-rights organization against Saguenay Mayor Jean Tremblay.

The court ordered the City of Saguenay and the mayor to stop the prayers. It also ordered the city and Tremblay to pay Simoneau a total of \$33,200 in compensatory damages, punitive damages and costs.

The Supreme Court did not rule out the presence of religious symbols, because it decided to limit the scope of its investigation to prayer only.

In 2011, Quebec's human rights tribunal ordered an end to prayers, demanded that a crucifix in the city council chamber be removed and awarded damages to Simoneau.

But the outspoken mayor fought back, raising money from supporters through the city's website. Tremblay said it was a battle for Quebec's Roman Catholic heritage.

The Quebec Court of Appeal overturned the tribunal's decision in 2013.

The appeals court expressed some reservations about religious symbols in the council chamber, but concluded

the city imposed no religious views on its citizens.

It ruled reciting a prayer does not violate the religious neutrality of the city and if the recitation interfered with Simoneau's moral values, interference was trivial

The Supreme Court of Canada agreed to hear the case last year.

State must be neutral, court rules

In 2008, city officials initially changed the prayer to one it deemed more neutral and delayed the opening of council by two minutes to allow citizens a window to return follow the reciting.

The Supreme Court said Canadian society has evolved and given rise to a "concept of neutrality according to which the state must not interfere in religion and beliefs."
